City Updates

The City submitted a capital construction request to the office of Representative Jami Cate for matching funds to work in concert with an IFA loan to convert the Jackman Well for municipal use. Efforts on this project continue with support from Business Oregon. An original report similar to Business Oregon's request was assembled in 2017 and can be provided to potential contractors. Ultimately, the City needs an updated version of the report that was completed at the time.

Sodaville was one of only six cities to submit written legislative testimony in favor of the Oregon Mayors Association homelessness proposal that would have provided funding for every city to deal with homelessness. Only three elected municipal officials testified during the committee hearing on housing funding. While the Mayor of Portland's testimony would normally hold a lot of sway during such a hearing, it is unlikely that this funding will pass the legislature.

Habitat for Humanity is continuing construction of a home on Ridge Street. The project blueprints are available for review in City Hall. A Habitat for Humanity representative spoke to a Councilor recently and claimed that one of the lots traded by the city is potentially not buildable due to the placement of the septic system. The representative claimed that the City will need to offer an alternative lot in exchange despite the lack of any other land available anywhere within city limits or the Urban Growth Boundary.

Comcast installed a WiFi hotspot in the park that allows any customer to receive an Internet connection. These will allow the City to operate cameras in the downtown corridor. Camera prices are attached to the packet.

10.a. Small Municipalities Advocacy Coalition

Staff Summary

The City of Brownsville is proposing that several small cities in Linn County participate in an advocacy coalition to better represent small city interests during sessions of the Oregon Legislative Assembly. This coalition would be represented by a public affairs firm that currently represents Linn County in Salem. A proposal prepared by Brownsville's administration is included in the packet for review by the Council. The cost to Sodaville would be \$75 per month. Brownsville City Administrator Scott McDowell will present in person.

10.b. Employee Compensation

10.c. Contract Review Board - Koontz & Blasquez

Staff Summary

The City's 5-year audit contract with Koontz, Blasquez & Associates, P.C. ends this year. Koontz Blasquez provided a one-year renewal contract to the City. Total cost for the audit increases to \$8,900.00. During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the city has spent \$6,300.00, so the contract represents a 41% increase. The Council can approve this contract or issue an RFP. While the Secretary of State recommends switching auditors every five years as a best practice, it is unlikely that a new auditor could be procured before the end of this fiscal year, and certainly not before the budget-writing cycle when cost changes would need to be factored into the 2023-2024 finance plan. Staff recommend renewing the contract for one year and planning an RFP for auditing services to be presented well in advance of the next budget cycle to properly implement the procurement process. A motion is necessary if the Council wishes to renew; if the Council does not wish to renew, staff will prepare an RFP for the next Council meeting.
